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How Bays and Headlands Form Answers



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1.

Child's image should show clearly different sections of rock type. (By use of different colours or patterns, or by labelling.)

The coastline is made up of sections of softer and harder rock.

2.

Child's image should show the repeated action of the waves.

Waves attack the coastline.

3.

Child's image should show bays beginning to develop as the softer rock is eroded (forming a scalloped effect to the coastline.)

The softer rock is eroded more quickly than the harder rock.

4.

Child's image should show clear headlands surrounding a bay area.

The harder rock is not eroded as quickly and forms a headland separating the bays.
